7. Al Menchaca, John Knotts and Dan VanWert had the most double bogies with eight. Louis Menchaca, Steve VanWert, Paul Garcia and Leon McLin had the fewest double bogies with two.
8. Josh Howard had the most “others” with 10. Louis Menchaca, Steve VanWert and Willie Mojica had the fewest “others” with zero.
9. Louis Menchaca had the lowest gross score with 83. Josh Howard had the highest with 129.
10. Ronny Copeland had the lowest net score with 67 and Josh Howard had the highest with 92.
11. Paul Garcia had the most consecutive pars with four. Gary Muniz had the most consecutive bogies with six.
12. Ronny Copeland had the fewest putts with 28 and Ben Hiller had the most with 45.
13. On hole number 12, many of us found disaster. The average score on the par 3 was 5.4 strokes for the whole group. Louis Menchaca had the only par and Steve Schlemmer carded a smooth 12.
